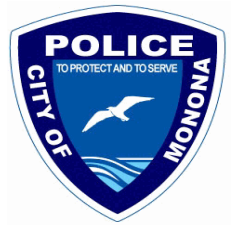

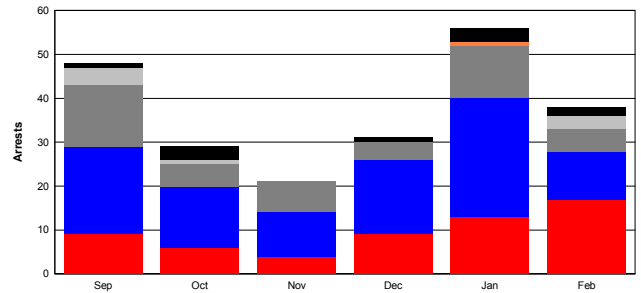

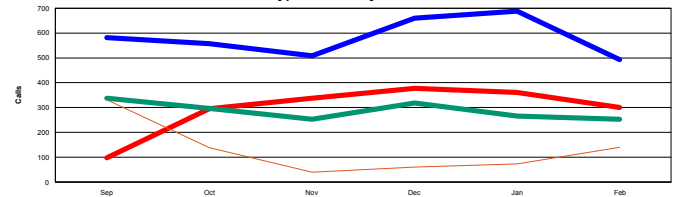
Arrests by Month

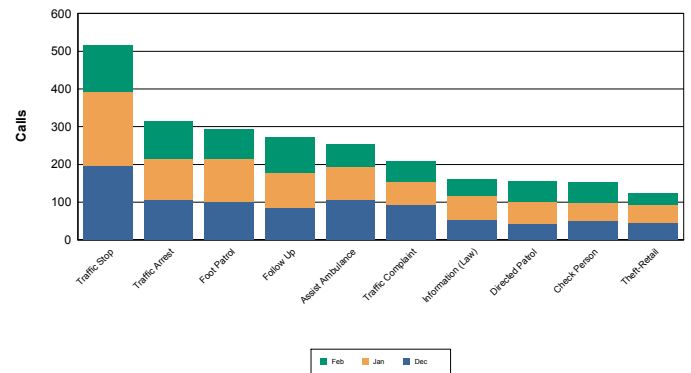

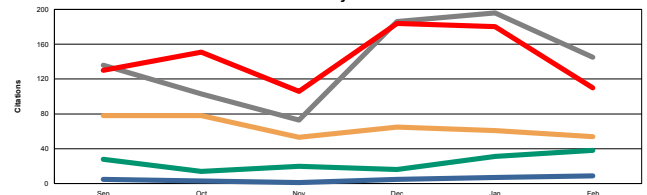

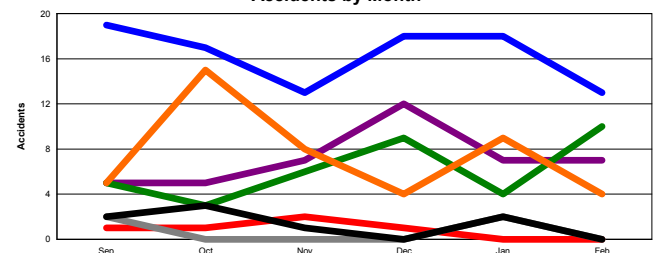

OPERATIONS DIVISION

In February of 2020, the Operations Division handled 34 vehicle crashes and issued 110 traffic warnings, 145 traffic citations, and 38 parking tickets. Our calls total for February was 1,186 calls for service.

Security Checks

Officers performed 79 security checks in the month of February. A security check is when an Officer goes into a business and walks around to meet with staff to discuss any problems that the businesses are aware of. This also serves as a deterrent for theft. For the overnight shift, this entails checking the perimeter of the business and pulling on doors to make sure the businesses are secure.

Retail Thefts

There were 31 retail theft cases in February, down quite a few from the 48 cases in January. Around 40 cases are typical in a month. These cases can be time consuming if the suspect flees and follow-up outside the City is necessary.

Tellurian Treatment Center

In February we had 18 calls to the Tellurian property totaling 14 hours of police time.

Use of Force Incidents

On February 9th at 1:53 am an Officer stopped a car for running a stop sign. The car initially fled at speeds of 100 MPH but then pulled over. During a search of the vehicle a loaded handgun was located. The driver was cited for Speeding, Operating While Suspended, and Carrying a Concealed Weapon. (MO20-01793)



On February 24th, at 1:30 am an Officer was requested for mutual aid to McFarland for a brief vehicle pursuit which had turned into a foot chase. Our Officer observed the suspect and held him at gunpoint where the male followed commands to lay on the ground with his hands out to the side. The male was then handcuffed and turned over to the McFarland Officer. The Officer requested we stand by with the suspect's car, and at that point our Officer observed a Glock handgun on the passenger side floor. The suspect had multiple arrest warrants including one for armed robbery. (MO20-02417)

Citizen Complaints

There were no citizen complaints in February.

1st Shift Monthly Report

On February 8th, 2020, at 8:58 am, an Officer was dispatched to a domestic disturbance. A male was destroying his female roommate's property. The male broke the females TV, jewelry box, TV stand, and cut up her shoes. The male had left prior to police arrival and was taken into custody at his workplace. The total of the property damage was estimated at \$500. (MO20-01759)



On February 11th, 2020, at 8:28 am, an Officer was dispatched to Wal-Mart for a retail theft. An adult male stuffed \$334 worth of merchandise into his snow overalls. The male was issued a citation for retail theft and the property was returned. (MO20-01877)

2nd Shift

Here is the second shift activity report for the month of February 2020. Officers conducted 111 traffic stops, handled 16 Retail Thefts, and 23 crashes. We also made one OWI arrest.

The following are some of the cases second shift handled this month.

On February 4th Officers located a vehicle on USH 12 eastbound that had fled from the Town of Madison Police. The Monona Officer attempted to stop the vehicle and a pursuit ensued. The pursuit ended on the north side of Madison with the lone occupant taken into custody. She was taken to the Dane County Jail on numerous charges.

On February 6th Officers responded to Denny's in the City of Monona for a disturbance. An employee reported that a customer was very upset about how her eggs were prepared. The customer went to the order station and began screaming at the employees. Once the customer discovered that the police were called she fled. The suspect remains at large.

On February 10th Officers were dispatched to Walgreen's for a stolen vehicle. The victim advised that he parked his vehicle and left it running unlocked in the parking lot of Walgreens. The victim stated he was in the store not very long and when he came out his car was gone. In reviewing the surveillance video it showed an unknown person run up to the vehicle about 30 seconds after it was parked. The suspect got into it and drove off. The stolen vehicle was located on February 11th a short pursuit ensued but was terminated. The vehicle was discovered unoccupied shortly thereafter.

3rd Shift

The Monona Police Department third shift officers handled 5 retail thefts, 9 business alarms, arrested 6 individuals with active arrest warrants, and responded to several disturbance calls during the month of February. Officers made 78 traffic stops resulting in 4 OWI arrests. Of those 78 traffic stops, 47 were given warnings, while 31 were issued citations.

On February 8th, at 12:55 am, a traffic stop was conducted on a vehicle for speeding, 100 mph in a 55 mph zone. The operator was arrested for OWI 5th offense. A search warrant was obtained for a legal blood draw; those results later showed a B.A.C. of .25g/210L. The operator was booked in at the Dane Co jail.

On February 11th, at 11:20 pm, an officer observed a vehicle that had been stolen from Walgreens in Monona around 8:30 pm traveling southbound on Stoughton Road. The officer attempted to make a traffic stop but the vehicle eluded the officer and they terminated their pursuit. A McFarland Police Officer observed the vehicle southbound

on HWY 51 and attempted to stop the car but it again eluded the officer. Officers later recovered the vehicle on Horned Owl Drive and attempted a K9 track for the suspects, which was unsuccessful. The vehicle was processed and returned to its owner.

On February 11th, at 2:59 am, a traffic stop was conducted on a vehicle that was deviating from its lane of traffic. The operator of the vehicle was arrested for OWI 2nd offense, with a B.A.C. of .18g/210L.

On February 14th, at 2:02 am, an officer observed a possible drug transaction occur in the Denny's Restaurant parking lot. Officers contacted the vehicle and located 23grams of cocaine. The occupants were cited for possession of cocaine.

On February 21st, at 1:30 am, officers responded to a single vehicle crash on Broadway near Antlers Bar. As a result of the investigation officers identified the driver of the vehicle who was arrested for OWI 3rd offense, with a B.A.C. of .20 g/210L.

On February 25th, at 1:37 am, McFarland Police Department was in a pursuit with a vehicle and requested mutual aid from officers as the suspect fled on foot. A Monona officer located the suspect running away from officers and was able to take him into custody. During a search of the suspects' vehicle officers located a Glock handgun along with related for the use of drug sales.

Members of the Investigative Unit were assigned to, or assisted with, the investigation of 20 current and past incidents.

Current Investigations

MO20-01459 – BATTERY

Detectives assisted patrol with video evidence and charging decisions on a battery that occurred at a local bar.

MO20-01880 – THEFT

Detectives are currently working a case where a resident was scammed out of money online while attempting to purchase Milwaukee Bucks tickets.

MO20-01025 THEFT

Detectives are working a case where wheels were stolen from a local business. A potential suspect has been identified, but criminal charges are not likely in this case due to lack of evidence and a very low dollar amount lost.

MO20-01874 - INVESTIGATION

A subject called 911 saying that he buried a body behind an address in the City of Monona. He provided vague details and indicated this took place 10-15 years ago. A possible suspect was interviewed but he denied making the report. It is suspected this subject may have some mental health issues. Detectives brought in a cadaver K9 to the target address and the K9 did not alert.

MO20-01759 - DOMESTIC ARREST

We had probable cause to arrest a suspect involved in a Domestic incident for charges of Strangulation, Disorderly Conduct, Criminal Damage to Property, and Bail Jumping. The suspect had a history of resisting arrest with Officers and was known to be trained in various martial arts. Detectives put together an arrest team and were able to successfully arrest the suspect without incident outside his workplace in Madison.

School Resource Officer

February 2020 consisted of me handling 28 cases total. 24 cases at the Monona Grove High School, 3 cases at MG21 and 1 case at Winnequah Elementary School. I issued 2 citations for Disorderly Conduct, 1 citation for Habitual Truancy, 1 citation for Possession of a Controlled Substance, 1 citation for Possession of Marijuana, 7 citations for Harassment, and 3 Parking citations.

I attended a webinar on Victimology and attended an active threat conference in Oshkosh that involved debriefs from some of the most recent active threat incidents around the country.

On 02/03, two students at MG21 got into a physical altercation. One was upset about something that was said and posted on social media. The upset student pushed, slapped, punched, and spit on the other student. The student was issued school consequences and a citation for Disorderly Conduct.

On 02/10, a Child Protective Service referral came into the PD. It stated a high school student had been sexually assaulted by a peer. The victim was eventually interviewed and provided some details regarding the incident, but refused to provide the name of the suspect. The victim was advised to report the name when they were ready, so possible charges could be filed with the DA.

On 02/11, a high school student reported hearing another student talking about having a gun in class. Several other students were interviewed along with the suspect. It was determined the suspect was talking about a Nerf gun. The suspect was searched and had no weapons. The suspect's mother also consented to a search of the suspect's bedroom and no weapons were found.

On 02/18, a high school student pulled down the pants of another student. A confrontation ensued and the first student, punched the victim of the pantsing in the face. A staff member had to break up the fight. The victim did not want to pursue charges, so the first student was issued a citation for Disorderly Conduct for creating a disturbance in the lunch room.

On 02/24, two high school students got into a verbal altercation with a parent at the girl's basketball game. The students shared personal information about the parent in a Snapchat Group before sending private messages to the parent on Instagram. Numerous other students also posted negative reviews of the parent's business on Google. Seven students were issued Harassment citations stemming from the continued harassment after the basketball game.

Citation and Arrest Statistics

Each of the adult and juvenile arrests and referrals take at least an hour of the Dispatchers' time to complete the reports and intake paperwork for the Dane County District Attorney's Office. Once completed these forms and reports are reviewed by the Investigations Lieutenant before submitting them to the DA's Office. Each of these submissions is reviewed for referral to the Dane County Community Restorative Court (CRC). CRC is a program to address youthful offenders, age 17 – 25, with little or no Criminal History in a restorative justice model as an alternative to formal criminal charges. The CRC Referrals line above shows the number of Adult Arrests & Referrals who qualified to participate in CRC. Offenders who fail to complete CRC are referred back to the DA's Office for formal charging.

Dispatch

The Monona Communications Center answers business line calls for Police, Fire, and EMS incidents. Calls for service for Fire and EMS are transferred to the Dane County Communications Center for dispatching of Monona Fire and EMS personnel. The Monona Communications Center advises Police of high priority Fire and EMS calls in the event Officer Response is required. Many of the business line calls include routine phone calls from citizens who are not only seeking police assistance, but also assistance with processing citation payments, requesting police records and general assistance. The dispatchers are also responsible for preparing and filing officer reports, citations, accidents, parking, UCR reporting and many other routine daily duties.

During the month of February, Dispatchers handled 1,186 calls for service. Most of these calls for service were received on the non-emergency lines, via personal reporting at the Police Department, transfers from the Dane County Communications Center or as self-initiated calls directly from Monona Officers.
