OPERATIONS DIVISION

In January of 2019, the Operations Division handled 29 vehicle crashes and issued 90 traffic warnings, 144 traffic citations, and 111 parking tickets. Our calls total for January was 1,259 calls for service.

Training

All Officers attended the January In-Service covering Handgun, Rifle, Stop the Bleed, Tactical Room Entry and a Standardized Field Sobriety Testing refresher.

Security Checks

Officers performed 139 security checks in the month of January. A security check is when an Officer goes into a business and walks around to meet with staff to discuss any problems that the businesses are aware of. This also serves as a deterrent for theft. For the overnight shift, this entails checking the perimeter of the business and pulling on doors to make sure the businesses are secure.

Retail Thefts

There were 26 retail theft cases in January, down quite a few from the 46 cases in December. Around 40 cases are typical in a month, but January had some very cold weather. These cases can be time consuming if the suspect flees and follow-up outside the City is necessary.

Tellurian Treatment Center

In January we had 19 calls to the Tellurian property totaling 14.5 hours of police time.

Use of Force Incidents

On January 11th at 10:24 pm Officers responded to a domestic dispute occurring at Denny's. The male half fled on foot with the female's keys and wallet. K9 Miya tracked the suspect who was hiding in a camper nearby. In the process of getting the male out of the camper, the assisting McFarland Officer had his handgun out and a Monona Officer had his Taser out. The male was then placed into handcuffs without issue. The male was taken to jail for Domestic Disorderly Conduct and a Probation Hold.

On January 12th at 9:27 pm an Officer was getting onto the beltline HWY and observed a car traveling approximately 100 MPH in the 55 MPH Zone. The Officer attempted to make a traffic stop but the driver accelerated even more. The Officer terminated the pursuit per policy. Only a partial plate was obtained so no further action could be taken for this incident.

On January 15th at 12:22 pm Officers responded to the crash listed below where 4 juveniles fled on foot from a stolen auto. A Monona Officer un-holstered his handgun for the search of the marsh area behind Staples and pointed it at a suspect hiding in the marsh until another officer could secure the suspect into handcuffs.

On January 19th at 2:30 pm an Officer was dispatched to Tellurian for a report of an intoxicated suicidal client. The client needed to be taken to detox but refused to cooperate. The Officer then went to handcuff the client and she struggled with the Officer. After continued verbal instructions were not followed, the officer delivered a knee strike to obtain compliance, and eventually the Officer was able to gain control of the client's arms to secure her in handcuffs. The client was then transported to detox where she registered a .39 on a PBT. No charges or citations were issued for this incident.

On January 27th at 1:25 am an Officer heard that a County Deputy was going to attempt to stop a stolen car heading towards Monona. Our officer observed the car southbound on Monona Drive at 56 MPH. The vehicle slowed down but refused to stop. The driver then turned onto Owen Road and struck a tree. Two people fled from the vehicle. No further leads have been developed regarding who was driving this vehicle.

Citizen Complaints

There were no citizen complaints in January.

1st Shift

On Tuesday, January 15, 2019, at 12:22 pm, Monona Officers responded to eastbound US HWY 12 near Monona Drive for a reported two vehicle crash and both vehicles were recently stolen, one from Fitchburg and one from Sun Prairie. Four male juveniles were seen running north from the Beltline towards the area of Monona Drive and Broadway. The subjects entered the Staples store in the Pier 37 shopping center. Officers converged on the area and were able to take one of the subjects into custody. The other three cut through the stock room and ran out the back door towards Ahuska Park. One of those subjects was taken into custody on the football field. A perimeter was set up with assistance from Dane County Deputies, Madison and McFarland Police Departments.

After a search with a K-9 unit, one subject was found hiding under a tree near the baseball field and the other was tracked to a marshy area adjacent to the park. Offenders are all African American males, one is 14 years of age, two are 15 years of age and the fourth one is 16 years old. All of the subjects have lengthy histories of stealing vehicles and one was a reported runaway. All four were transported to the Juvenile Detention Center.

2nd Shift

Officers conducted 83 traffic stops, handled 16 Retail Thefts and 22 crashes. There was also one arrest for Operating While Intoxicated.

The following are some of the cases second shift handled this month.

On January 11th, Officers responded to Denny's in the City of Monona for a disturbance. Upon arrival Officers were told by a female that her boyfriend and her got into a verbal argument. The argument was over who was going to pay for the bill. When the female said she could only pay for her meal the male became upset and threw the remainder of his food at her. He then fled without paying. When the female went to leave the male was waiting for her outside and attempted to take either the car keys or her wallet from her purse. That is when Officers arrived on scene. The male fled behind the Shell Gas station. A K9 track was conducted and the male was located hiding inside a camper behind the gas station. He was arrested and transported to the Dane County Jail.

On January 15th, Officers were dispatched to Papa Murphy's Pizza on Broadway for an armed robbery. Dispatch advised that a lone male entered the business and robbed it. The suspect fled with an undisclosed amount of money. Mutual Aid was requested and a perimeter was established. A K9 track was conducted, but the suspect was not located. During the investigation of this robbery it was learned that the male was also a suspect in a string of robberies in the Dane County area. A task force was established with multiple agencies and the suspects were later arrested and charged with several robberies.

3rd Shift

Officers handled 5 retail thefts, 10 business alarms and responded to several disturbance calls. Officers made 68 traffic stops resulting in one OWI arrest. Of those 68 traffic stops, 35 were given warnings, while 33 were issued citations.

On January 15th, at 11:55 p.m., officers responded to Speedway South for a Retail Theft involving Newport cigarettes. Officers identified the suspect in this case and have probable cause to arrest her for this incident along with 11 other counts of Retail Theft.

On January 25th, at 11:58 p.m., officers responded to Wal-Mart, for a Retail Theft. Officers arrested a 26-year-old male, for stealing \$266 worth of merchandise. During a search of the suspect, officers located a small amount of methamphetamine. The suspect was transported to the Dane County Jail on criminal charges.

On January 27th, at 12:37 a.m., a traffic stop was conducted on a vehicle for operating without any lights on during the hours of darkness. The operator was arrested for OWI 1st offense, with a B.A.C. of .18.

On January 27th, at 1:23 a.m., officers were advised of a stolen auto being pursued by the Dane County Sheriffs Department on Monona Drive from Cottage Grove Road. It was also noted that the vehicle was reported stolen earlier in the day from a residence in the City of Monona. A Monona officer intercepted the vehicle and engaged in a short vehicle pursuit prior to the vehicle sliding off the roadway and into the snow bank on Owen Road at Bridge Road. The suspects fled from the vehicle and a perimeter was established. During this the suspects were seen running into the apartment complex of 6417 Bridge Road. The suspects were not apprehended. The investigation is ongoing.

Community Relations

During the month of January, Community Resource Officer Reiter was involved in the following crime prevention and community relations activities:

Instructed for the first in-service of 2019 as a firearms instructor. We also covered Stop the Bleed First Aid with tourniquets and wound packing.

Officer Wunsch and I taught ALICE training at IHM School to all the staff members. The training consisted of a PowerPoint and hands on drills. Staff went through three scenarios with the first being a distraction drill allowing staff to throw objects at the suspect, the second was denying entry into room, and the third was both distraction and denying with sounds of gunfire in the hallways. The police department used blank rounds to simulate what gunfire would sound like and provide a more real life situation.

Throughout the month of January, I conducted several traffic enforcements on the south end of Winnequah Road. There has been a number of reported citizens' complaints in the morning hours when the bus is picking up children.

A civilian response to active shooter training was conducted at the Monona Library for the Public Safety Committee. All Monona committee members were allowed to show up. This training provides people with ways to help keep safe and what they should do in case of an active shooter.

Attended a Stop the Bleed trainer course in Verona. During my teachings of active threat, many people have asked what they should do if they were ever shot. This training will allow me to teach people those basic skills.

Had a meeting with Joy from the Dementia Friendly to discuss bringing training to Monona. Joy donated several bags of items to the Police Department in case we have contact with someone with Dementia to help them through our contact.

Members of the Investigative Unit were assigned to, or assisted with, the investigation of 24 current and past incidents.

Current Investigations

MO18-14760 – RETAIL THEFT

A retail theft was forwarded to detectives for investigation. The suspect was identified as a result of pawning the stolen items. The suspect was cited for two retail thefts.

MO18-15645 – BURGLARY

A Monona resident reported a residential burglary to a vacant rental house. The owner believed that the previous renters were suspects. There was no forced entry and a low-dollar amount of property belonging to the previous residents was taken. The previous residents were interviewed. No criminal charges are anticipated at this time.

MO18-14758 – RETAIL THEFT

A local store reported two past retail thefts. Detectives developed a possible suspect but it is doubtful the case will be strong enough to meet the necessary burden of proof.

MO18-15614 – FRAUD

A local store accepted several checks that were returned as fraudulent/stolen. Detectives developed a suspect and the investigation is ongoing.

MO18-00518 – ARMED ROBBERY

A woman reported being robbed at gunpoint while in her car at a local store. Patrol arrived, took the report and developed a suspect. Detectives were able to solidify the identity of the first suspect and positively identify the second suspect.

MO18-00610 – ROBBERY

A local business was robbed by a male implying he had a weapon. This case was solved after arresting a man and woman for multiple robberies throughout the county.

MO18-00835 – DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

This was an on-going domestic violence situation between a couple arrested for multiple robberies. Based on our investigation, charges were referred against the male half.



MO18-14690 - THEFT

This case involved several incidents of a suspect stealing hundreds of dollars’ of cigarette cartons. The suspect has been identified and was arrested on 02-04-19 in Monona. She was charged with 12 counts of retail theft.

School Resource Officer

In the month of January, I handled 16 cases at the Monona Grove High School, 1 case at MG21, 0 cases at Winnequah Elementary, and I assisted Cottage Grove Police SRO Helgeland at Glacial Drumlin Middle School with 1 case. I issued 1 citation for Possession of Marijuana, 1 Habitual Truancy citation, 2 Disorderly Conduct citations, 1 Theft citation, 1 Vaping in an Educational Facility citation, 1 Possession of a Controlled Substance citation, and 6 parking citations.

I attended my quarterly PD In-service. I gave 6 classroom presentations on heroin, synthetic drugs, and vaping/Juuling. I also trained Immaculate Heart of Mary Catholic School staff in ALICE (active shooter response).

At MGHS two male students were caught in a bathroom stall together. When confronted by the associate principal a THC vape device was located on one of the students. The student would not admit to smoking the device. The oil inside the cartridge tested positive for THC. The student in possession of it was issued a citation for Possession of a Controlled Substance.

At MG21, two female students got into an argument, which quickly turned into a fist fight. One party admitted throwing a soda bottle at the other, which sparked the physical fight. The fight was separated by staff. Both involved students were issued citations for Disorderly Conduct.

An MGHS student reported his Beats by Dre headphones stolen back in October. After a thorough investigation and some luck, the headphones were located at another student's house. I verified the serial number matched the headphones. Another student came forward and admitted to taking the headphones during football season and leaving them at the student's house. The student who took the headphones was issued a citation for Theft.

An MGHS student brought an unknown visitor to school to "shadow" him. After being told the unknown student needed to leave because the appropriate paperwork was not completed, both subjects wandered the halls. I contacted the MGHS student and noted he smelled strongly of marijuana. The unknown subject left the building. A locker search was performed by the associate principal and a small bag containing 4.09 grams of marijuana was located inside the student's backpack. The student was issued a citation for Possession of Marijuana.

Citation and Arrest Statistics

During the month of January, the Monona Police issued numerous traffic citations, municipal ordinance (non-traffic) citations, parking citations and warnings. In addition, there were many referrals for charges. See the detail below.

Each of the adult and juvenile arrests and referrals take at least an hour and a half of the dispatchers' time to complete the reports and intake paperwork for the Dane County District Attorney's Office. In addition, Police staff must follow up by going to the DA's office to sign probable cause forms, as well as, review and electronically sign complaints to ensure the subjects are properly charged or held on charges.

Dispatch

The Monona Communications Center answers 911 and business line calls for Police, Fire, and EMS incidents. Calls for service for Fire and EMS are transferred to the Dane County Communications Center for dispatching of Monona Fire and EMS personnel. The Monona Communications Center advises Police of high priority Fire and EMS calls in the event Officer Response is required. Many of the business line calls include routine phone calls from citizens who are not only seeking police assistance, but also assistance with processing citation payments, requesting police records and general assistance issues. The dispatchers are also responsible for preparing and filing officer reports, citations, accidents, parking, UCR reporting and many other routine daily duties.

During the month of January, Dispatchers handled 1,259 calls for service. Most of these calls for service were received on the non-emergency lines, via personal reporting at the Police Department, transfers from the Dane County Communications Center or as self-initiated calls directly from Monona Officers. On January 10th, all landline 911 calls were automatically transferred to and answered by the Dane County 911 Center. The Dane County 911 Center Call Takers enter the calls in the TriTech CAD and the information is immediately visible to our Police Dispatchers. The Dane County 911 Center does maintain the ability to transfer 911 calls back to the Monona Dispatch Center if determined appropriate. The process appears to be working well.
