OPERATIONS DIVISION

In March of 2019, the Operations Division handled 33 vehicle crashes and issued 189 traffic warnings, 203 traffic citations, and 26 parking tickets. Our calls total for March was 1,434 calls for service.

Training

Officer Landon Flora attended Advanced Roadside Impaired Driving Enforcement training (ARIDE), on March 20th through March 21st at the Oregon Police Department.

Our newest hire, Officer Jesse Mashak, was hired on March 1, 2019 and began his 16 week long Field Training program.

Security Checks

Officers performed 154 security checks in the month of March. A security check is when an Officer goes into a business and walks around to meet with staff to discuss any problems that the businesses are aware of. This also serves as a deterrent for theft. For the overnight shift, this entails checking the perimeter of the business and pulling on doors to make sure the businesses are secure.

Retail Thefts

There were 39 retail theft cases in March, up a few from the 35 cases in February. Around 40 cases are typical in a month. These cases can be time consuming if the suspect flees and follow-up outside the City is necessary.

Tellurian Treatment Center

In March we had 16 calls to the Tellurian property totaling 10.5 hours of police time.

Use of Force Incidents

On March 7th, 2019 at 3:43 am Officers responded to a retail theft in progress. Upon arrival the suspect was driving away and refused to stop for the emergency vehicle. The driver then fled on foot. The Officer engaged in a foot pursuit and quickly caught the male. The male fought with the Officer and was decentralized. Upon arrival of a second officer the male was placed into handcuffs. The male was on Probation and they placed a hold on him. The male was arrested for Resisting Arrest and Eluding, and cited for Failure to Stop at a Stop Sign, Violating a Red Traffic Signal, and Unreasonable Speed. (MO19-02727)

On March 16th, 2019 at 1:04 am an Officer observed a vehicle on the beltline traveling 88 MPH. Upon attempting to stop the vehicle, the driver increased speed to over 100 MPH. The car came back as stolen from Madison. The pursuit was terminated per policy. (MO19-03224)

On March 16th, 2019 at 7:35pm Officers responded to the laundromat on Broadway for a report of a male threatening females with a knife. Upon arrival the suspect was observed outside the business and an officer held him at gun point until backup could arrive. The male customer was upset at a female customer for being inconsiderate and he pulled out a folding knife and opened the blade, allegedly stating “damn right I got a knife”. The male was arrested for Disorderly Conduct While Armed and held on a Parole Violation. (MO19-03261)



Citizen Complaints

There were no citizen complaints in March.

1st Shift

On March 8th at 10:20 pm a second shift officer located a hit and run suspect vehicle traveling northbound from the beltline. A traffic stop was made and a strong odor of marijuana allowed for a search of the car where an illegally possessed loaded 9mm handgun was located hidden under the seat beside a mask. Marijuana allowed for this Officer to take this loaded gun off our streets. The driver was cited for operating while suspended, and arrested for carrying a concealed weapon.

On Tuesday, March 11, 2019, at 8:05 am an Officer located an occupied vehicle involved in a Madison retail theft. When the Officer went to handcuff the male, he fled on foot. A citizen in a blue car intentionally cut off the running male twice to slow him down. Once other Officers got in the area, the male gave up and was handcuffed. The male was turned over to a Madison Officer and upon running his name was found to have an active arrest warrant from Probation and Parole. Monona's involvement added a criminal charge of resisting arrest for this individual.

On Thursday, March 21st, 2019, Officers responded to a typical retail theft call. A female concealed property then met up with a male. Both were detained. The female was cited for retail theft and released. The male on scene ended up having a warrant. Once at the jail, the male had to walk through a scanner, where it was discovered he had concealed some syringes in a place a pat down would not locate them.

Community Relations

During the month of March, Community Resource Officer Reiter was involved in the following crime prevention and community relations activities:

I provided a tour of the Monona Police Department to a group of girl scouts. The scouts learned about how 911 works and what equipment a police officer may carry on their person and in the squad cars.

I gave two separate presentations at Monona Grove High School for Juuling dangers. The presentation was sponsored the State of Wisconsin and Monona Cares. The presentation was given to the entire student body.

Officer Wunsch and I gave a Stop the Bleed course to Monona Grove School District Staff. This course gives people the knowledge about bleeding control, use of a tourniquet, and wound care.

During the month of March I was assigned to Field Train Officer Mashak.

The speed board was deployed for the first time this year. It was placed on the south end of Winnequah Road, but then had to be put away again due to inclement weather.

2nd Shift

Here is the second shift activity report for the month of March 2019. Officers conducted 98 traffic stops, handled 23 Retail Thefts, and 16 traffic crashes.

The following are some of the more significant cases second shift handled this month.

On March 10th Officers responded to Walgreens to assist an outside agency with a fraud. There were two suspects who were stealing people's wallets from an athletic club then using the credit cards. These suspects were traveling across the nation committing this crime. Officers arrived on scene and detained two suspects. During the investigation numerous items were discovered on the suspects that did not belong to them. Some of these items were linked to thefts in Monona that had just occurred and some of the items linked them to crimes in Racine County. The suspects were picked up by a transport vehicle and taken back to Racine County on Felony charges.

On March 16th Officers were sent to Broadway Laundry located in the 1000 block of East Broadway for a man threatening a woman with a knife. Officers arrived on scene and detained a man who was pointed out by the victim. During the investigation it was discovered that the suspect and the victim got into a heated verbal argument over one of the laundry carts and who was using it. The verbal argument escalated to the point where the male pulled out a knife. The offender was arrested and taken to the Dane County Jail.

On March 20th Officers were sent to Wal-Mart for a fight in progress. Upon arrival the two suspects had been separated. It was learned that a female customer at the self-checkout became upset when the pants she was buying wouldn't ring up due to missing a barcode. The employee advised that a different pair of pants would be needed. The customer became upset and started becoming belligerent towards the employee. A different customer standing in line told the female that there was no reason to be so nasty.

This upset the female who then became belligerent towards the other male customer. Words were exchanged and the female customer took a couple of swings at the male customer. That female customer also threw a 20 oz bottle of soda at the male striking him. He then threw the female to the ground and pinned her down. Both customers were cited.

On March 25th about 10:15 pm Officers were sent to the area of Frostwoods Road and Bridge Road for the sound of a single gunshot. Dispatch advised that there were a couple of callers. One thought it was closer to Monona Drive and Frostwoods the other thought it was closer to Winnequah near Frostwoods. None of the callers saw or heard any disturbance before or after the shot. No vehicles were seen leaving the area. Officers arrived in the area and searched the area. Nothing was located.

3rd Shift

The Monona Police Department third shift officers handled 7 retail thefts, 10 business alarms and responded to several disturbance calls during the month of March. Officers made 141 traffic stops resulting in 7 OWI arrest. Of those 141 traffic stops, 89 were given warnings, while 47 were issued citations.

On March 1st, 2019 at 1:27 a.m., a traffic stop was conducted on a vehicle for speeding 64 mph in a 40 mph zone. The operator was arrested for OWI 3rd offense, with a B.A.C. of .13g/210L. The operator who had provided a false name to the investigating officer was also taken into custody on 2 active arrest warrants and transported to the Dane County Jail.

On March 7th, 2019 at 3:43 a.m., officers responded to a Retail Theft at Wal-Mart. As officers got into the area the suspects fled in a vehicle. Officers located the vehicle and attempted to make a traffic stop. The vehicle attempted to elude the officers for a short distance, then stopped and the driver fled on foot. Officers engaged in a foot pursuit with the suspect and he was apprehended. While officers pursued the suspect on foot another suspect took off in the vehicle. Officers took the apprehended suspect to the Dane County Jail on felony charges. The second suspect was identified and charges were referred to the Dane County DA's office for charges.

On March 16th, 2019 at 11:24 p.m., a vehicle was stopped for speeding, 80 mph in a 55 mph zone. The operator was arrested for OWI 3rd offense, with a B.A.C. of .18g/210L. During a search of the suspect and vehicle 14.5grams of marijuana and 4.9 grams of ecstasy was located.

On March 17th, 2019 at 2:37 a.m., a vehicle was stopped for speeding, 74 mph in a 55 mph zone. The operator was arrested for OWI 1st offense, with a B.A.C. of .10 g/210L. During a search of the suspect .3 grams of cocaine was located on his person.

On March 23rd, 2019 at 12:58 a.m., officers responded to the 200 Block of Valorie Lane for a weapons violation. Multiple callers reported hearing a disturbance that had occurred followed by a single gunshot. Officers arrived on scene and did not locate any disturbance or individuals involved. The investigation is ongoing.

On March 29th, 2019 at 12:40 a.m., an officer observed a vehicle traveling over 100 mph on HWY 12. The officer made a traffic stop on the vehicle which was slow to stop. A high risk traffic stop was conducted and two occupants were taken into custody. The suspects were arrested on numerous drug charges related to the investigation and transported to the Dane County Jail. During a body search of the suspects at the jail, conducted by a Dane County Sheriff's Deputy, more controlled substances were located hidden within the body cavities of both suspects. Overall, over 40 grams of marijuana, 35 grams of ecstasy and 13 grams of cocaine were seized.

Members of the Investigative Unit were assigned to, or assisted with, the investigation of 32 current and past incidents.

Current Investigations

MO18-00518 – ARMED ROBBERY

A woman reported being robbed a gun point in a car at a local store. Patrol arrived, took the report, and developed one suspect. Detectives were able to solidify the identity of the first suspect and positively identify the second suspect. A search warrant was served to Facebook and detectives are waiting on the results.

MO19-03192 – INSUFFICIENT FUNDS CHECKS

A local store received a bad check which cost the business thousands of dollars. A suspect has been identified and the investigation is ongoing.

MO19-03037 – FRAUDULENT USE OF CREDIT CARD

A resident had a helper for routine errands who used his debit card without permission and stole thousands of dollars from him via ATM withdrawals. A suspect has been identified.

MO19-03097 – PHYSICAL ABUSE OF A CHILD

A mother reported possible physical abuse of her children while they were at their father's house in Monona. A Safe Harbor interview was conducted and the case will be sent to the DA's Office for review.

MO19-02412 - PRESCRIPTION FRAUD

This was a case where the owner of a prescription (Female) was in jail but it was found that her prescriptions were still being picked up (She was in jail for three months straight now). During this investigation, detectives found that her boyfriend was the one picking them up. Eventually, she was interviewed and she advised that she authorized her boyfriend to pick them up because she kept thinking that she was getting out soon. When the boyfriend was contacted, he actually had all of the prescriptions. All of the prescriptions were seized and the female's prescribing doctor was alerted to what she did. No charges were issued in this particular case.

MO19-03181 - BATTERY

This was a case of a woman getting battered inside an apartment in the 300 block of Owen Road. The male suspect was found a couple of blocks away. We received very conflicting stories on what led up to the battery to include drug usage and relationship/stalking issues. The male was charged but his charges were later dropped by the district attorney's office.

MO19-03671 - CHILD PORNOGRAPHY

Based on a Cyber Tip through Microsoft, Detectives conducted a search warrant in the 6400 block of Westgate Road. The resident adult there was found to be sharing their Wi-Fi and password with neighbors. For this and other reasons, no charges will be filed in this case.

School Resource Officer

The month of March brought with it warmer weather and Spring Break for MGSD students. It also brought plenty of educational opportunities for students and parents regarding drugs and inappropriate behavior. I handled 31 cases at the Monona Grove High School, 0 cases at Winnequah Elementary School and 1 case at MG21. I issued a citation for Habitual Truancy, 4 Disorderly Conduct citations, 2 Possession of a Controlled Substance citations, 2 Vaping in an Educational Facility citations, 3 Possession of Marijuana citations, 1 Possession of Drug Paraphernalia citation, 1 Possession of Tobacco/Nicotine citation, 1 Possession of a Dangerous Weapon on School Grounds citation, and 10 Parking citations.

I completed a train the trainer "Stop the Bleed" course on March 1, and subsequently trained over 50 MGSD staff members on tourniquets and wound packing in the event of traumatic injury. CRO Reiter also assisted with this training. I also instructed in 5 classrooms on Heroin, Synthetic Drugs, and Vaping. A Juul/Vaping forum was held on March 6 and 13 for the entire MGHS student body.

On March 2, two students showed up for Saturday School at MGHS and decided to go into the bathroom to use a dab pen (liquid THC vaping device). The students were caught and the device confiscated. Citations were issued.

On March 4, at 8:10 AM a fist fight broke out near the pool between two students. The parties were separated by staff members. Both students were issued citations.

On March 5, a student returned to school under the influence of marijuana. After further investigation another student was caught in possession of a marijuana blunt. This led to another student being interviewed and searched on March 6, which turned up a dab pen and 2 additional marijuana blunts. Two students received citations.

On March 8, a student was sent out of class for possibly being under the influence drugs. The student exhibited slurred/slow speech, a thick tongue, blood shot and glassy eyes, very heavy eyes, and poor balance. The student denied taking any drugs, but a parent came to pick her up.

On March 14, a student returned from lunch and smelled strongly of marijuana. A search of his person and backpack yielded 4 grams of marijuana, a Juul vape device, a marijuana grinder, and 2 lighters. Citations were issued.

On March 15, I witnessed a brief hand to hand transaction between 2 students outside the bathroom. Searches of the students and interviews yielded liquid THC, a cigarette, and empty Juul vaping pods. Both students were issued citations.

On March 18, a teacher reported the boy's locker room smelling of marijuana. I was able to locate a locker containing a backpack that had residual marijuana in it. A Madison K-9 was brought in at the school's request and the remainder of the locker room was searched. No other drugs were found. No citations were issued in this case and it is still being looked in by the school.

On March 20, two female students were not getting along and one had called the other a name on Snapchat the night before. When they saw each other in the hallway, one grabbed the other by the hair and dragged her to the ground. They each pulled the other's hair until a staff member broke them up. Both were issued citations.

On March 20, a student reported to me he had been thrown against the wall by another student. His sweatshirt was ripped and he had a mark on his neck. After further investigation the first student had supposedly threatened to shoot the other with a BB gun. Information was developed that the BB gun was in the student's vehicle, which was parked on school grounds. A search of the vehicle yielded a BB gun. Both students involved received citations.



March 21, a student reported her friend was suicidal and making threats to harm himself. I discovered the student did not go to MGSD. I contacted the SRO of the appropriate school and passed on the information. The student voluntarily sought treatment.

Citation and Arrest Statistics

During the month of March, the Monona Police issued numerous traffic citations, municipal ordinance (non-traffic) citations, parking citations and warnings. In addition, there were many referrals for charges. See the detail below.

Each of the adult and juvenile arrests and referrals take at least an hour and a half of the dispatchers' time to complete the reports and intake paperwork for the Dane County District Attorney's Office. In addition, Police staff must follow up by going to the DA's office to sign probable cause forms, as well as, review and electronically sign complaints to ensure the subjects are properly charged or held on charges.

Dispatch

The Monona Communications Center answers 911 and business line calls for Police, Fire, and EMS incidents. Calls for service for Fire and EMS are transferred to the Dane County Communications Center for dispatching of Monona Fire and EMS personnel. The Monona Communications Center advises Police of high priority Fire and EMS calls in the event Officer Response is required. Many of the business line calls include routine phone calls from citizens who are not only seeking police assistance, but also assistance with processing citation payments, requesting police records and general assistance issues. The dispatchers are also responsible for preparing and filing officer reports, citations, accidents, parking, UCR reporting and many other routine daily duties.

During the month of March, Dispatchers handled 1,434 calls for service. Most of these calls for service were received on the non-emergency lines, via personal reporting at the Police Department, transfers from the Dane County Communications Center or as self-initiated calls directly from Monona Officers. On January 10th, all landline 911 calls were automatically transferred to and answered by the Dane County 911 Center. The Dane County 911 Center Call Takers enter the calls in the TriTech CAD and the information is immediately visible to our Police Dispatchers. The Dane County 911 Center does maintain the ability to transfer 911 calls back to the Monona Dispatch Center if determined appropriate. The process appears to be working well.
