OPERATIONS DIVISION

In May of 2019, the Operations Division handled 21 vehicle crashes and issued 189 traffic warnings, 176 traffic citations, and 37 parking tickets. Our calls total for May was 1,520 calls for service.

Training

Officer James Reiter attended a 16-hour Advanced Group Crisis Intervention training through CVMIC.

Security Checks

Officers performed 135 security checks in the month of May. A security check is when an Officer goes into a business and walks around to meet with staff to discuss any problems that the businesses are aware of. This also serves as a deterrent for theft. For the overnight shift, this entails checking the perimeter of the business and pulling on doors to make sure the businesses are secure.

Retail Thefts

There were 42 retail theft cases in May, down a couple from the 46 cases in April. Around 40 cases are typical in a month. These cases can be time consuming if the suspect flees and follow-up outside the City is necessary.

Tellurian Treatment Center

In May we had 9 calls to the Tellurian property totaling 5 hours of police time.

Use of Force Incidents

On May 6th, 2019 at 2:25 am an Officer observed a suspected drunk driver with suspended plates. Upon seeing the police car, the driver accelerated and pulled into an apartment underground parking lot with the Officer following. The driver struck the wall as she attempted to park. The driver refused numerous commands to step out of the vehicle. The driver's roommate entered the garage area and also tried to get the driver to exit. The driver was given a final warning then the Officer forced the window open. The Officer then unlocked the door and removed the driver who resisted for a couple of minutes. The Driver was cited for Operating While Revoked and Operating with a Suspended Registration and arrested for 4th Offense OWI and Resisting Arrest. (MO19-05777)

On May 14th, 2019 at 1:54 am a vehicle was observed speeding 69 MPH in a 45 MPH zone. The driver refused to pull over and accelerated to speeds of 95 MPH in a 55 MPH Zone. The pursuit was terminated per policy. Another Officer ran the plate and observed the registered owner lived in the direction the car was traveling. The Officer went to that address and as this car stopped in the street at the home, the driver exited and fled on foot. The Officer pursued and decentralized the man to the ground. The male was arrested for Felony Eluding and Resisting Arrest. The driver was not intoxicated and had no warrants. (MO19-06047)

On May 16th at 9:56 pm an Officer was dispatched to the Wal-Mart for suspicious activity. A customer at the self-checkout attempted to use between 15-20 different credit cards. The suspect was leaving in a car upon police arrival and upon attempting to stop the car, they accelerated rapidly to over 100 MPH. The pursuit was terminated per policy. Approximately 10 minutes later another agency located the vehicle which was abandoned while running. The car was later reported as stolen. (MO19-06201)

On May 21st at 2:47 am an Officer observed a suspicious vehicle near Wal-Mart with the plates not matching the color or make of the car. Upon seeing police the car fled the lot at a high rate of speed. A traffic stop was attempted and the car fled at speeds of over 100 MPH. The pursuit was terminated per policy. (MO19-6410)

On May 22nd at 10:14 am an Officer responded to Wal-Mart for a retail theft in progress. A male and female concealed \$85 worth of merchandise and were leaving on foot. As the female was being handcuffed by one officer, the male pushed the other officer away and took off running. The male was warned a Taser would be deployed if he did not stop. After a few warnings a Taser was successfully deployed and the male was handcuffed. EMS checked on the male and he was then taken to jail for Retail Theft, Resisting Arrest, Possession of Drug Paraphernalia, and Bail Jumping. The female was cited for Retail Theft and Possession of Drug Paraphernalia. (MO19-6516)

On May 31st at 7:58 pm an Officer was requested at McDonalds South for a person driving recklessly in the lot. The car was leaving upon Officer arrival and then fled from an attempt to stop the car. The car fled at speeds of 70 MPH on Broadway and the Officer terminated the pursuit per policy. (MO19-6961)

Citizen Complaints

There were no citizen complaints in May.

1st Shift Monthly Report

On May 9th, 2019, at 9:56 am, an Officer was issuing a parking ticket when he observed drug paraphernalia on the center console. This was a student's car parked in the school lot. The student consented to a vehicle search and the drug paraphernalia along with 10 cans of beer and a bottle of Vodka were located and removed. Citations were issued. (MO19-5830)



On May 21st, 2019, at 7:27am, an Officer responded to a one car crash. As a driver turned a corner, her coffee spilled on her lap. In response, the driver then accidentally hit the accelerator instead of the brake and struck a house. The driver was not injured but the shrubbery and house had some damage. (MO19-6419)

2nd Shift

During the month of May 2019, officers on the 2nd shift conducted 120 traffic stops, handled 24 Retail Thefts, and 8 crashes. We also made 1 OWI arrest.

The following are some of the cases second shift handled this month.

On May 2nd Officers responded to a possible drug deal in the 6400 block of Copps Avenue. The caller gave the license plate and description of a vehicle and its occupants, stating they were selling drugs. When Officers arrived in the area the vehicle was leaving. Officers developed reasonable suspicion to stop the vehicle and did so. During the investigation Officers recovered over 25 grams of cocaine base, three bags of marijuana each weighing a little over 4 grams and a fourth bag of marijuana weighing 20 grams. Also discovered was a scale, a pipe, and some cash. The suspect was booked into the Dane County Jail on numerous drug charges.

On May 5th Officers responded to the ER of St. Mary's Hospital for a patient who wanted to report a battery. This incident took place in the 1200 block of E. Broadway. Officers learned that the victim was punched by her ex-boyfriend. The victim explained that she was at Denny's when her ex-boyfriend and his new girlfriend arrived. The two women knew each other and were talking. The male became upset and wanted to leave. The male then came over and began punching his girlfriend. His ex-girlfriend tried to break the fight up and was punched too. Charges were referred to the District Attorney's office on the male half.

On May 13th Officers responded to a disturbance in the 2400 block of W. Broadway. Upon arrival they observed a female standing in the doorway to a business yelling loudly. That female was detained and there was another female yelling in the store. Broken glass was also observed on the floor. During the investigation Officers learned that a mother and daughter came to the business to get their nails done. When the work was done for the mother and half the work for the daughter was done they were given the bill. Apparently the mother didn't know how much it was going to cost and became upset when she got the bill. The mother began yelling and screaming at staff. She then threw a vase on the ground and shattered it. The daughter was also yelling at staff. Both were cited for disorderly conduct.

On May 16th Officers were sent to the 1000 block of E. Broadway for a disturbance. Upon arrival Officers discovered that a woman became very upset when her boyfriend stepped outside to smoke a cigarette without telling her. When she found her boyfriend outside smoking she slapped him in the face, pushed him several times, and took his ring off his finger then threw it. The female was arrested and taken to jail on domestic disorderly conduct charges.

3rd Shift

The Monona Police Department third shift officers handled 10 retail thefts, 17 business alarms and responded to several disturbance calls during the month of May. Officers made 175 traffic stops resulting in 4 OWI arrest. Of those 175 traffic stops, 111 were given warnings, while 64 were issued citations.

On May 3rd, 2019 at 1:36 a.m. a vehicle was stopped for deviating from its designated lane of traffic on HWY 12. The operator was arrested for OWI 2nd offense. A search warrant was obtained for a blood sample, as 125 pills of Etizolam were located in the vehicle. Etizolam is currently illegal in the United States. The blood results are pending and detectives are working with the DEA on how the pills were obtained.

On May 22nd, 2019 at 10:44 p.m. third shift officers responded to a two vehicle crash on the 6200 blk of Monona Drive. The investigation determined that a vehicle was traveling south on Monona Drive at a high rate of speed when it struck a vehicle making a left turn into Taco Johns. The speeding vehicle proceeded to roll several times ejecting the passenger from the vehicle. In total 5 occupants were injured and transported to local hospitals. The investigation is ongoing.



On May 26th, 2019 at 12:49 a.m. a vehicle was stopped for deviating from its designated lane of traffic on the 6200 Block of Monona Drive. The operator was arrested for OWI 3rd offense.

On May 26th, 2019 at 3:00 a.m. a vehicle was stopped for an improper stop, stopping an entire length of a vehicle across the stop line, blocking a lane of traffic. The operator was arrested for OWI 1st offense with a B.A.C. of .16g/210L.

On May 30th, 2019 at 3:18 a.m. officers responded to Walmart for a retail theft. While officers were enroute dispatch advised the suspects got into a white Malibu which was reported as stolen out of Rockford, IL. Officers arrived at scene and conducted a high risk contact on the suspects who were taken into custody. All four subjects were cited for Retail Theft. The operator was transported to the Dane County Jail for operating a stolen auto.

Community Resource Officer

During the month of May, Community Resource Officer Reiter was involved in the following crime prevention and community relations activities:

I instructed firearms for the department in-service at the Madison Police Training Center.

I attended a training Dane County Task Force training at the Madison Police Department with other Monona Officers. The training offered some basic training and tips for drug investigations and what the Dane County Task Force can do to help.

I attended a two day Advanced Group Crisis Intervention Training through CVMIC at Fitchburg. This is the second training I've received to help with peer support and critical incident stress.

I attended Elder Abuse training with the Dane County ADRC. The training provided great tools and information on scams with the elder population which I'll be able to share with our Monona Community.

Officer Hoffman and I attended the annual Wisconsin Law Enforcement Memorial on the Capital Square. This is a time for Wisconsin to honor and remember fallen officers from the past year.

I took a report from the UPS Store of a possible scam with an elder resident. The store intercepted a package and learned there was \$2,000 within the package. The elder resident wished to give the money to a friend of a friend because that person was "down on their luck". I worked with Dane County Elder Abuse to assist with future money transactions and developing a plan for this resident.

I completed the annual Dane County Command Vehicle driver refresher training at MATC.

I worked the annual Memorial Day Parade with the rest of the department.

I covered several dispatch and patrol shifts during the month of May.

I completed a building safety assessment with a business within 200 River Place. They wished to know what they can do to help reduce possible intruders and unwanted people from entering their office space. Upon completing the assessment the business was provided with a thirteen page report on ways to help with their needs regarding safety.

Members of the Investigative Unit were assigned to, or assisted with, the investigation of 30 current and past incidents.

Current Investigations

MO19-04739 – ID THEFT/UNAUTHORIZED USE OF CREDIT CARD

A victim reported her debit card was fraudulently used to make cash withdrawals at an ATM. Detectives identified the suspect by using the Wisconsin Crime Alert Network. A 16 YOA was cited for unauthorized use of a credit card.

MO19-06119 – COMPUTER CRIME

A parent contacted the police with concerns of a minor child exchanging nude pictures online. Detectives examined the minor's phone with consent and found evidence there was "sexting" going on between teenagers. The minor and parent were educated about this type of dangerous behavior. No criminal charges will be filed.

MO19-06517 – INJURY CRASH

Detectives assisted with an injury crash after the fact by obtaining warrants for multiple different pieces of evidence to help determine if there will be any criminal liability.

MO19-06086 - THREATS/STALKING

Detectives have been investigating a case where someone at a Monona Company has been threatening a fellow employee via letters/notes. There are no leads on the suspect and the case may take an extended amount of time until the suspect is identified. Many of the threats are quite disturbing to the victim.

School Resource Officer

The month of May was another busy month. I handled 44 cases at the Monona Grove High School, 1 case at MG21 and 0 cases at Winnequah Elementary School. I issued 4 Habitual Truancy citations, 2 Possession of a Controlled Substance citations, 1 Vaping in an Educational Facility citation, 1 Underage Possession of Alcohol citation, 1 Possession of Nicotine citation, 2 Trespassing citations, and 10 Parking citations.

I attended a School Safety Meeting in Sun Prairie and a Drug Task Force Meeting at the Madison Training Center.

On 05/03/19, an art class was on a walking field trip. While walking down the sidewalk, a student dropped a THC vaping device, better known as a “dab pen,” from his pocket. The teacher saw it, confiscated it, and sent the student back to school. The student received school consequences and confirmed it was a “dab pen.” He was issued a citation for Possession of a Controlled Substance.

On 05/03/19, a MGHS staff member noticed 2 people in the commons during lunch that did not appear to be MGHS students. They eventually left the building after being asked. I identified both people and determined one of them attended LaFollette High School and the other attended Verona High School. During a voluntary search of both subjects, the remnants of a marijuana blunt were found along with some nicotine juice. Both subjects were released without a citation and warned about trespassing on MGHS property.

On 05/16/19, the same LaFollette High School student returned to the MGHS campus with another friend from Deerfield High School and placed a diaper on a MGHS student’s vehicle. A Monster Energy drink and a Twix bar were put in the diaper to make it look like a used diaper. The incident was captured on video. Both subjects were identified and issued citations for Trespassing.

On 05/23/19, two separate reports came in regarding a high school student looking at guns on his Chromebook in class and making a comment about “everybody dying tomorrow.” There was also a rumor around the school of the student talking about shooting up graduation. MGHS administration and I interviewed numerous students regarding the information received and the rumor. After a careful and thorough investigation, the student was deemed to not be a threat. The information was more

rumor than fact. As piece of mind to staff, students and family members, an additional police officer was assigned to worked graduation.

Citation and Arrest Statistics

During the month of May, the Monona Police issued numerous traffic citations, municipal ordinance (non-traffic) citations, parking citations and warnings. In addition, there were many referrals for charges. See the detail below.

Each of the adult and juvenile arrests and referrals take at least an hour and a half of the dispatchers' time to complete the reports and intake paperwork for the Dane County District Attorney's Office. In addition, Police staff must follow up by going to the DA's office to sign probable cause forms, as well as, review and electronically sign complaints to ensure the subjects are properly charged or held on charges.

Dispatch

The Monona Communications Center answers 911 and business line calls for Police, Fire, and EMS incidents. Calls for service for Fire and EMS are transferred to the Dane County Communications Center for dispatching of Monona Fire and EMS personnel. The Monona Communications Center advises Police of high priority Fire and EMS calls in the event Officer Response is required. Many of the business line calls include routine phone calls from citizens who are not only seeking police assistance, but also assistance with processing citation payments, requesting police records and general assistance issues. The dispatchers are also responsible for preparing and filing officer reports, citations, accidents, parking, UCR reporting and many other routine daily duties.

During the month of May, Dispatchers handled 1,520 calls for service. Most of these calls for service were received on the non-emergency lines, via personal reporting at the Police Department, transfers from the Dane County Communications Center or as self-initiated calls directly from Monona Officers.
